




About Wood County Health Department

Statement of Receipts & Disbursements

The 2024 Statement of Receipts and Disbursements provides a clear overview of Wood County Health Department's financial activity, outlining all funds received and all expenditures made throughout the year. This summary reflects our commitment to transparency and responsible stewardship of resources.

Although three, short-term factors led 2024 expenditures to exceed revenue, WCHD remained within its approved budget. These factors did not impact operations or services to the community.


- 1. Building Renovation: WCHD began the design for a building renovation, resulting in some project expenses in 2024.
- 2. Schedule of Grant Reimbursements:
 Grant funded expenses occurred in December 2024, with reimbursement received in January 2025.
- 3. Return of Grant Funds:
 Grant funds from 2023 that had been overpaid were returned to the Ohio Department of Health.



Leadership in Action: Community & Public Health

Through coalition work, professional presentations, trainings and targeted grant initiatives, Wood County Health Department leads efforts that strengthen public health and expand impact both locally and beyond.

From Funding to Impact

Wood County Health Department continues to grow and strengthen our ability to serve the people of Wood County. Grant funds allowed our agency to increase access to fresh, healthy food, opportunities to be physically active and live tobacco-free, as well as infectious disease prevention, increase access to healthcare and promote environmental programs.

Funding Source	Amount	Impact
EO Grant	\$3,500,000	This source helped our staff provide vital resources to stop illness before it spreads.
Home Sewage Treatment System (HSTS) Repair & Replacement Grant	\$150,000	This grant helped homeowners cover the cost of fixing or replacing failing home sewage systems, protecting local water quality and preventing health risks.
Creating Healthy Communities (CHC) Grant	\$110,000	The grant supported a community garden in North Baltimore and began work in Plain Township to improve transportation and inclusive play—efforts that will continue over the next five years.
Project Firstline	\$200,000	This grant allowed WCHD to provide local healthcare facilities with tools and training to prevent the spread of infections, helping ensure safer care for patients and families. WCHD was one of 15 local health departments to be awarded this grant.
Tobacco Prevention & Cessation	\$90,000	Offered education and resources to help youth and adults quit smoking and avoid tobacco use, improving overall community health.
MRC Strong Grant (Medical Reserve Corps)	\$310,212	Strengthened our community's ability to respond to emergencies by training volunteers—both medical and non-medical—to assist during disasters or health crises.
H5N1 Grant	\$50,000	Supported response efforts during the first case of bird flu in an Ohio livestock operation, helping protect local farms and preventing wider spread.
Mosquito Control	\$20,248	Funded mosquito surveillance and control programs in collaboration with Ohio EPA and BGSU to reduce bites and prevent mosquito-borne illnesses, helping keep outdoor spaces safer for everyone in Wood County.

Local Action, Broader Influence

Throughout the year, agency staff shared expertise at national and state conferences, including the NACCHO Preparedness Summit, NACCHO360, American Occupational Health Conference and Ohio Environmental Health Association events.

On October 4, the Environmental Health Division hosted its second annual Fall Seminar, drawing over 55 attendees. The event provided CEUs for professionals and learning opportunities for students, covering topics such as illicit fentanyl in Ohio's opioid crisis, human trafficking, harmful algal blooms, PFAS and the science of cannabinoids. Experts from the Ohio Attorney General's Office, REACH, U.S. EPA and the University of Toledo also presented.

VAPE Coalition


Wood County Health Department formed the VAPE Coalition, a student-led initiative focused on educating and training young people about the harmful effects of vaping and nicotine use to become champions of change in their communities. This group met once a month at the Health Department and created their own plans to tackle this public health issue in Wood County. Some of their work included attending events at BGSU to perform tobacco screenings and referrals as well as presenting to community members on the dangers of nicotine use.






Impact Through Mental Health Initiatives

Mental health is a key indicator of health status and was a focus of the health department in 2024. Suicide and drug addiction are two major conditions used to evaluate mental health. However, mental health is complex and requires additional assessments for an accurate measure. Wood County suicide deaths have decreased in recent years but death by suicide still remains a major cause of premature death. Wood County accidental overdose deaths have decreased by 41% since 2015.





Expanding Who We Serve Through Harm Reduction

Project DAWN is an Ohio Department of Health (ODH) initiative providing naloxone distribution and overdose education and Wood County Health Department proudly serves as one of its local program sites. First responders receive training to use naloxone when they encounter an overdose emergency. In the Fall of 2024, we collaborated with ODH's Project DAWN program to extend this training to tow truck drivers who work alongside first responders.

Through Project DAWN, our partners at ODH provided training to our staff and members of our Medical Reserve Corps (MRC) Volunteer program who signed up to be program trainers. Trainings and free Narcan distribution began in Fall of 2024 to tow truck drivers who work alongside Wood County first responders. Refills can be obtained through the Wood County Community Pharmacy, through the NARCAN vending machine, or online through the Project DAWN website. Beyond local impact, this program supports expansion to other counties across Ohio.



This program was developed in collaboration with Ohio Department of Health, WCHD, Representative Haraz Ghanbari, Wood County EMA, and the Wood County Alcohol, Drug Addiction and Mental Health Services Board.





Public Health Hero | Sharon Schaeffer

Each year on Public Health Thank You Day, Wood County Health Department takes a moment to recognize an individual who has made a significant contribution to improving the health of our community. In 2024, the Health Department was proud to honor Sharon Schaeffer, a dedicated member of our Health Center Board who has served three terms and has been an invaluable asset to our work. Sharon's leadership has been instrumental in the growth of our health services, including the expansion of our dental and behavioral health programs. As Chair of the Health Center's Quality Committee, she oversaw numerous clinical improvements and helped secure key recognitions from the National Committee for Quality Assurance and the Health Resources and Services Administration. With a background in nursing and public health, Sharon has been a vital advocate for both staff and patients, making complex health concepts accessible to all.

Sharon has also spent over 17 years working in public health, including roles with Erie County's WIC program. She currently serves as a faculty member at Bowling Green State University, educating future public health professionals. Sharon's leadership has left an indelible mark on our Health Center and she will be deeply missed as she retired from the Board in 2024.




Strengthening Partnerships & Community Health

In 2024, the Wood County Health Department focused on advancing community health through expanded collaboration and strengthened partnerships.

Wood County Committee on Aging

In 2024, WCHD continued its strong partnership with the Wood County Committee on Aging by ensuring access to vaccinations for seniors and vital health screenings such as cholesterol checks. A registered nurse was present at each clinic to provide health education, resource referrals and personalized consultations, ensuring seniors received the support they needed to maintain their well-being. These monthly clinics were held at senior centers in Bowling Green, Rossford and Walbridge — a special effort in 2024 that helped make preventive care more accessible for older adults.



Educational Partners

Partnering with educational institutions is essential for health promotion and preparedness, and, in 2024, the Health Department made significant strides in this effort. Continued work with Bowling Green State University, the University of Toledo and Southern New Hampshire University public health interns allowed students to gain valuable experience and while providing support to the efforts of the Health Department. Additionally, communicating with Wood County school nurses regularly provided a strong connection between local public health and education.



Broadening Access to Prevention and Support

Recognizing the importance of healthy environments throughout Wood County, the health department implemented community resource improvements including touchless water bottle fill stations, new sinks to promote safe handwashing and HVAC cleaning to enhance air quality. Access to essential infection control resources remained a priority with continued operation of the infection hotline and distribution of home test kits.

Community Resources: Women, Infants, and Children (WIC)

The Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children (WIC) provides nutrition and breastfeeding education, healthy foods and referrals to health and social services.

Community Resources: Creating Healthy Communities

In October, Wood County Health Department's Nutrition Division was awarded the Creating Healthy Communities (CHC) grant, building on the work completed through the HEAL Capacity Building grant in the previous year. The CHC grant provides the agency with the opportunity to collaborate with priority communities in Wood County, like North Baltimore, to prevent and reduce chronic diseases by improving access to affordable healthy food and increasing opportunities for physical activity.



Community Resources: Vital Statistics

The Vital Statistics Office at Wood County Health Department issues birth and death certificates for individuals born or deceased in Ohio. These records are important for many life events, from enrolling in school to applying for a passport, and our team is here to make the process simple and convenient.

Clean Plate Award

In June 2024, the Clean Plate Award was presented to 38 licensed food facilities in recognition of their commitment to outstanding sanitation and food safety practices. To be eligible, facilities must meet strict criteria. There are over 800 licensed food facilities in Wood County.


Protecting the Community Against Disease

Infectious disease outbreaks are monitored by WCHD epidemiologists. When a potential outbreak occurs, investigations are conducted to prevent further spread of a disease, determine its cause and reduce the likelihood that it will reoccur. There are over 80 diseases that are required to be reported to the Wood County Health Department per the Ohio Administrative Code.

Pertussis (Whooping Cough)

Pertussis is a very contagious respiratory illness that resembles a common cold such as sneezing, runny nose, low-grade fever and a mild cough. Within two weeks, the cough may become severe and cause episodes of numerous rapid coughs followed by a crowning or high-pitched whoop.

During 2024 there were 18 pertussis cases in Wood County which peaked in the month of November. This is a significant increase from the typical 1-2 cases in previous years.



Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza A (HPAI H5N1)

HPAI H5N1, commonly known as "bird flu," is a virus that has been detected among wild birds, poultry flocks, dairy cattle and mammals. In Wood County, there were no human cases and two animal cases (1 dairy cow, 1 cat). Individuals who come into contact with H5N1-infected animals or consume raw milk face a higher risk of infection. This first detection of HPAI in an Ohio livestock operation underscores the importance of rapid response, coordination and monitoring to protect animal health, safeguard the food supply and minimize economic and public health risks. La Conexión and WCHD also worked together to provide Spanish-language information on H5N1 prevention for farmworkers.

Our New Mobile Health Center

In 2024, Wood County Health Department introduced a new way to bring essential health services directly to our community—a mobile health center designed for long-term impact. Made possible through grant funding from the Ohio Department of Health, the mobile unit provides no-cost health screenings, respiratory illness testing and serves as a hub for health education throughout Wood County. These services help ensure our community stays healthy, informed and prepared year-round.

The mobile health center offered free screenings for blood pressure, blood sugar and cholesterol, along with flu and COVID-19 testing for all ages and RSV testing for youth under 18. To launch this new service, WCHD partnered with community organizations including Wood County Hospital, Mercy Health, La Conexión and the Wood County Committee on Aging to host mobile health clinics across the county throughout the fall of 2024. These events brought preventive care directly to residents—offering flu and COVID-19 vaccines, health screenings, on-site mammograms and tobacco cessation resources, with Spanish-language materials available to improve accessibility.

From August through December 2024, the mobile health center visited community events such as La Conexión's Latin Heritage Festival, the First Presbyterian Church Holiday Breakfast and the Veterans Day Lunch and Resource Fair. Residents had the opportunity to tour the mobile clinic, receive free COVID-19 tests and cold-season care kits and connect with staff for health information and referrals. By December 2024, more than 2,000 community members and stakeholders had engaged with the mobile health team.

Beyond screenings, the mobile health center continues to serve as a valuable resource for health education and disease prevention. Staff provide guidance on protecting against infectious diseases and other health concerns, reinforcing WCHD's commitment to building a healthier Wood County. By bringing these services directly into neighborhoods, WCHD is breaking down barriers to care and making health resources more accessible than ever.

An Award-Winning Health Center

Wood County Community Health Center (WCCHC) is a Federally Qualified Health Center (FQHC) and represents a beacon of comprehensive care. In 2024, WCCHC earned recognition as a Patient-Centered Medical Home with Distinction in Behavioral Health Integration by the National Committee for Quality Assurance. The health center also received national recognition from HRSA, earning a Health Center Quality Leader – Bronze badge and an Advancing Health IT for Quality Award. Among Ohio health centers, Wood County Community Health Center is in the top quartile for six clinical quality metrics and ended 2024 as #1 in the state for appropriate IVD Aspirin Use, #4 for Depression Screening and Follow-up and #4 for Tobacco Use Screening and Cessation. These honors place WCCHC among the top-performing health centers nationwide.

Expanding Behavioral Health Access

In 2024, the Community Health Center strengthened its behavioral health program with added expertise in child and addiction services. The team actively collaborates with community agencies to support case management, housing and family services. As a result, mental health and substance use disorder visits increased by more than 60% in 2024.


